LOST HUNTING GROUNDS

During most of June 1864, General Kenner Garrard's 2nd Cavalry Division, on the left flank of the Union army, kept up daily skirmishing with the Confederate Cavalry under Joe Wheeler.

Much of the action was in the vicinity of Noonday Creek, and both sides had camps and bivouacs near that creek. One of the larger camps covered several wooded knolls off old Roberts Road.

Old-time metal detectorists reported that before this area was developed, the camps yielded thousands of Sharps, Spencers, Burnsides, and other carbine bullets, buttons, spurs, stirrups, insignia, guns, and plates were among many good recoveries (back in the days of the 80s).

This area was completed destroyed by Town Center Mall – another of Cobb County's "lost Civil War" sites.

COIN CORNER

There has been 2 coins minted to commemorate Civil War battles. The Antietam half dollar was struck in 1937 to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the famous battle to stop Lee's invasion of Maryland. The opposing Generals McClellan and Lee are featured on the obverse (front), while the Burnside bridge is shown on the reverse.



The Gettysburg half dollar was authorized in 1936 to commemorate the famous battle. The obverse shows a portrait of a Union and Confederate Veteran, with the two shields representing the Union and Confederate armies on the reverse.
